(Nov. 22, 2020) — It is [said](#) that Third Reich führer Adolph Hitler once advised that “if you tell a big enough lie and tell it frequently enough, it will be believed.”

Hitler's Third Reich Minister of Propaganda, Josef Goebbels, added: “If you tell a lie big enough and keep repeating it, people will eventually come to believe it. The lie can be maintained only for such time as the State can shield the people from the political, economic and/or military consequences of the lie. The American mainstream media cabal seems to have framed these two aphorisms and mounted them on the wall for constant editorial reference.

Fast-forward to (or in digital-speak, “skip to”) the 2020 “election” fiasco. The term “election” is in quotation marks in recognition of the fact that, unless and until proof is adduced that the ballot-counting, software flipping and mail-in ballot anomaly questions are answered – a process still under way and thus, incomplete – the “results” of the recent activities masquerading as a fair election dictate the use of the quotation marks.

Adding insult to injury, the Gray Trollop labels as “unparalleled” President Trump’s efforts to resist the effects of The Spasm by exploring the [option](#) of driving the selection of the president into the House of Representatives. This, of course, is recognized and contemplated under the 12th Amendment, as discussed [here](#) and by others than your faithful servant [here](#).

While the Trollop article calls President Trump’s exploration of the 12th Amendment “unparalleled,” it attempts to paint the last prior similar effort in 1876, involving Republican Rutherford B. Hayes and Democrat Samuel J. Tilden as being [less contentious](#).

Really? Recall that in 1876, when the House voted Hayes to be the 19th President of the United States, it came as a result of the “[1877 Compromise](#).” Under the terms of the “compromise” – never reduced to writing – Democrats agreed, following an electoral vote tie, to not oppose awarding the presidency to Hayes in return for, among other things, the removal of federal troops from the South, leading to the end of the Reconstruction Era following the Civil War.

In addition, however, quoting from the Wikipedia entry (yes, Virginia..., take all things on the Internet and found on “open” websites like Wikipedia with a grain of salt...), “as soon as the troops left, many white Republicans also left, and the “[Redeemer](#)” Democrats, who already dominated other state governments in the South, took control. The exact terms of the agreement are somewhat contested as the documentation is insufficient [footnote omitted]. Black Republicans felt betrayed as they lost power and

were subject to discrimination and harassment to suppress their voting. *By 1905, nearly all black men were effectively disenfranchised by [Redeemer Democrat] state legislatures in every Southern state* [footnote omitted].” (Emphasis added)

Memo to the Trollop: the disenfranchisement of black male voters in the South between 1877 and 1905 was the direct result of actions by Democrats, not Republicans. Twelfth Amendment Annotated

The Electors shall meet in their respective states, and vote by ballot for President and Vice-President, one of whom, at least, shall not be an inhabitant of the same state with themselves; they shall name in their ballots the person voted for as President, and in distinct ballots the person voted for as Vice-President, and they shall make distinct lists of all persons voted for as President, and of all persons voted for as Vice-President, and of the number of votes for each, which lists they shall sign and certify, and transmit sealed to the seat of the government of the United States, directed to the President of the Senate;—The President of the Senate shall, in the presence of the Senate and House of Representatives, open all the certificates and the votes shall then be counted;—The person having the greatest number of votes for President, shall be the President, if such number be a majority of the whole number of Electors appointed; and if no person have such majority, then from the persons having the highest numbers not exceeding three on the list of those voted for as President, the House of Representatives shall choose immediately, by ballot, the President. But in choosing the President, the votes shall be taken by states, the representation from each state having one vote; a quorum for this purpose shall consist of a member or members from two-thirds of the states, and a majority of all the states shall be necessary to a choice. [And if the House of Representatives shall not choose a President whenever the right of choice shall devolve upon them, before the fourth day of March next following, then the Vice-President shall act as President, as in the case of the death or other constitutional disability of the President.—]The person having the greatest number of votes as Vice-President, shall be the Vice-President, if such number be a majority of the whole number of Electors appointed, and if no person have a majority, then from the two highest numbers on the list, the Senate shall choose the Vice-President; a quorum for the purpose shall consist of two-thirds of the whole number of Senators, and a majority of the whole number shall be necessary to a choice. But no person constitutionally ineligible to the office of President shall be eligible to that of Vice-President of the United States.
